

Environmental Resource Permitting (ERP)



Regulated Activities ERP

- Activities in, on, or over surface waters or wetlands
 - Dredging and filling, docks, etc.
- Any activity involving the alteration of surface water flows
 - Including new activities in uplands that generate stormwater runoff from upland construction





Florida has its own wetland and surface water delineation rule



Assumption

Florida's efforts to assume the dredge and fill permitting program under section 404 of the Clean Water Act (CWA)

Section 373.4146, Florida Statutes (F.S.)

• How did we get there?



• ERP

- Keep existing
- DEP/WMD/local government split

- State 404
 - In addition to ERP
 - DEP will issue all State 404 permits



Why Two Programs?

- ERP in retained waters
- Efficiency comes through coordination
- What might the future look like?
 - **•Possibilities include:**
 - "Chili and cheese" (program merging)
 - Delegation to WMDs
 - Would require U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approval



Rulemaking

Step 1 in Florida's assumption process



Purpose of Rulemaking

To bring in requirements of federal law not already addressed by ERP.



Rulemaking Timeline

• May 11, 2018 – Notice of Rule Development (NORD)

- **Three workshops**
 - May 30, 31, and June 1, 2020

• February 19, 2020 – Notice of Proposed Rule (NOPR)

- **•** Five virtual public hearings
 - Three webinars: April 2, 6, and 10, 2020
 - Two teleconferences: April 24 and 27, 2020

• July 21, 2020 – Rule Adoption

 Effective upon date EPA publishes program approval in Federal Register

- Public Notice published September 16, 2020
- Comment period ends November 2, 2020
- Docket: EPA-HQ-OW-2018-0640



Webinars

October 21 and 27, 2020



Anticipated decision date is December 17, 2020.



Preparing to Implement

Florida's preparations to implement assumption



- Weekly internal training webinars for staff
- Planning external training webinars closer to date of assumption
- Consideration for other states:
 Florida's staff are already trained in ERP review; only need to "fill the gap"
