ILLINOIS & THE NATIONAL WETLANDS INVENTORY

Wetland Summary

Wetlands cover about 3.5 percent of Illinois. The largest acreage of wetlands isin the bottom-land forests and swamps along the State's major rivers. Northeastern Illinois also has a large concentration of wetlands. Illinois has lost as much as 90 percent of its original wetlands over the last 200 years; most of the losses have been due to drainage for conversion to agricultural and other uses. The primary State law governing wetlands is the Interagency Wetland Policy Act of 1989, which sets a goal of no net loss of wetlands due to projects funded by the State. Wetlands can be owned and protected by the public as County Forest Preserve Districts. Wetlands on private lands can be protected using various conservations tools such as being designated as a Nature Preserve or Land and Water Reserve by the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission or by public entities such as Conservation or Forest Preserve Districts or the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.
