EPA identifies four core elements that comprise and strengthen effective wetlands programs. These core elements are basic program functions that we believe form the foundation of wetlands management and protection in a state or tribe.

## The Core Elements Of A Comprehensive Wetland Program:

- 1. Monitoring and Assessment Program for Wetlands
- 2. Regulatory Activities
- 3. Water Quality Standards for Wetlands
- 4. Voluntary Restoration and Protection Programs for Wetlands

1. Definition

2. Goals & Benefits

3. Program Building Activities Menu: Tables that include 3 Objectives, Key Actions and Program Building Activities

4. Resources

## Updates on Core Elements Framework

## For each Core Element we added new examples, actions and activities to:

- Capture cultural components of wetland program development
- Illuminate opportunities to consider underserved communities and environmental justice in wetland programs
- Amplify climate change and resiliency connections in wetland programs
- Update & improve readability of CEF tables

**Objective 1:** Clearly and consistently define restoration and protection goals throughout state or tribal territory or formalize a state/tribal voluntary restoration & protection program

Actions	Menu of Activities
b. Collect and Enhance wetland information as a foundation for a restoration and protection actions,	Develop a needs assessment for wetland restoration decision making tools (i.e., Monitoring protocols, functional assessment, restoration prioritization methods)
strategy or program	Identify or collect state tribal information related to rare, vulnerable, culturally important wetlands in your state and tribe
	Identify or collect information on cultural practices that are dependent on wetlands
	Identify and collect information on economic trends, resiliency and activities that are dependent on specific wetland complexes in your state or tribe

## Wetland Program Plans (WPPs): Benefits and Basics

#### **Wetland Program Plans: Basic Information**

WPPs are encouraged, but not required or mandated.

 WPPs are reviewed, commented on, and approved by EPA, but are not "scored."

Check with your EPA Regional Contact!

• WPPs should be generally consistent with the Core Element Framework, but do not need to cover all four Core Elements (i.e. may cover 1-4 Core Elements).

Check with your EPA Regional Contact!

 S/T encouraged to talk to the Region early on about content and process for WPPs.

#### **Wetland Program Plans: Why Do Them?**

• WPPs are a way for S/T to explain to a variety of audiences (internal and external) what it is they plan to do to develop and implement their wetland program over the next few years.

• WPPs is one mechanism by which EPA determines what technical and financial assistance to provide to S/T.

• WPPs allow local governments, universities, and other entities to potentially help the S/T build their wetlands programs.

### **Wetland Program Plans: Minimum Components**

 Narrative description of overall program goal(s) for time period of plan.

• Actions/activities generally consistent with the Core Element Framework to be undertaken.

 Implementation schedule for broader based actions and/or more specific activities (including overall timeline of 3-6 years).

#### Wetland Program Plans: Points to Consider

 Important to remember that WPPs will be made public upon approval from EPA.

 Be as specific as possible when articulating activities so that a reader would know if an activity has been accomplished.

• To the extent possible, the Region will review WPP progress with the S/T mid way (ex: Are milestones being met? If not, why not? What help can EPA provide to get S/T back on track? etc.)

## WPPs TO DO List: Take Away Messages

- Consider early engagement with your EPA Regional ESTP Coordinators
- Work with EPA Regional Leads for CWA/SDWA programs
- Track and revise your WPPs as needed
- Use your WPP as a communication and outreach tool
- Use your WPP to formalize promote partnerships and data sharing agreements
- Develop over-arching wetland program goals that are aspirational: choose and pursue specific actions in the CEF to demonstrate progress towards your goals

## A Few More Take Away Messages

- WPPs and wetlands grants can provide a good foundation for two-way communications with EPA
- Communicate your overall gaps in information and highlight the type of technical assistance you need from EPA
- Coalition-building can help EPA provide you better technical assistance. For example, if more than one Tribe within a specific eco-region express similar technical assistance needs, EPA is likely to respond more quickly
